

Regional coalitions

Coalition of Arab Cities against Racism, Discrimination, Xenophobia and Intolerance

- Launched in June 2008 in Casablanca, Morocco
- 23 member cities in 8 Arab countries



Coalition of African Cities against Racism and Discrimination

- Launched in September 2006 in Nairobi, Kenya
- 59 member cities in 18 countries

Mainstreaming gender in ...

Public Participation



- Choosing culturally and spatially appropriate places for holding stakeholder consultations (e.g. mixed or women only group)
- Establish standing committee on women inclusion to maintain engagement
- Define clear and measurable objectives for women participation, monitor and evaluate them.

Access to Information



- Acknowledge and address differences between men and women in terms of information needs, type of information and access channels
- Analyse the challenges that may hinder women's access to information (e.g. digital divide) and identify means of mitigation

Mainstreaming gender in ...

Sport for Youth Inclusion



- Include the promotion of gender equality and women/girls' empowerment as a clearly stated goal of sports projects, and evaluate it
- Take measures to ensure the participation of girls and women in sports programs and address gender-related challenges to participation (e.g. sports spaces are safe for women and girls, prevent bullying or harassment)
- Design sports programs to educate about gender equality
- Organize information sessions for parents (and the wider community) on the benefits of sport on the physical and mental health of girls

Citizenship and Human Rights Education



- Ensure women and girls are aware of their rights
- Involve associations defending women's rights in city work
- Select the implementation methods most suitable to the needs of women, and provide reassurance guarantees to women participants (e.g. photos not taken)
